# About Us

The Okanagan College Students' Union (OCSU) is made up of over 5000 members across three campuses in the Okanagan: Kelowna, Penticton, and Salmon Arm. We are also proud to be Local 1 of the British Columbia Federation of Students (BCFS).

This past year our Board of Directors voted to expand Kelowna's campus council to structure to reflect the growing student body at the Kelowna campus. Penticton and Salmon Arm's councils remained the same size as previous years. The number of Board members per campus remained the same so that each campus is still represented equally at the Board level. On top of our annual September elections, we also held a by-election in January to fill open spaces on the Penticton campus council, and the newly expanded spaces on the Kelowna campus council. Salmon Arm did not need to hold a by-election.

## Campus Council

On each campus, elected officials of the OCSU are chosen by the students; 6 in Penticton and Salmon Arm, and 8 in Kelowna. It is the job of the campus council to meet regularly to assess the wants and needs of members on their campus. Based on their findings they are to plan and hold events, carry out existing services, and implement new services for members as needed. On each campus council there is a campus chairperson who organizes and facilitates the meetings, and whose job is to ensure work report completion and submissions.

From each campus council there are representatives who are elected internally to form the OCSU Board of Directors

## Board of Directors

The Board of Directors is the decision making body for the entire Students' Union and decides the direction of the Union by creating various policies, and endorsing campaigns.

The Board meets on a monthly basis from October to April and as needed in the summer months. The Board delegates work each campus council and to the various committees of the OCSU. The Board also votes on any work submitted by OCSU committees.

## Committees

There are 3 committees that operate under the supervision of the OCSU Board. They are the External committee, Internal committee, and the Portfolio committee. Each committee is made up of a chairperson (Director) and one representative from each campus with the exception of the Portfolio committee, which is comprised of the Director of each committee and the Executive Chairperson.

The committees are designed to be small in order to complete work as efficiently as possible while still including all campuses in the conversation. Each committee submits monthly reports to the Board to ensure progress and to keep all members up to date with the on goings of the Union.

Overall it is the goal of the OCSU to create a structure that allows for transparent, efficient, and effective work to be done for the benefit of our members.

# Executive Summary

To our members,

The Okanagan College Students' Union (OCSU) was formed to advocate for students within Okanagan College along with supplying services and events steered towards the betterment of the institution's environment.

We, as a collective, are determined to not only advocate for goals such as lower tuition fees and social justice, but to empower our members. This past year has been an incredible time of triumphs and important steps forward which has reinvigorated our passion for students' rights and reminds us that our work matters and that, together, we can create change.

Two of our biggest victories came from the BC Government's changing climate. The outgoing Liberal administration lowered student loan interest from 2.5-5% *plus* prime to *just* prime. One of the first moves made by the incoming NDP administration was to reinstate free tuition for ABE and ESL programs and for former youth in care. We count these as some of the biggest victories of the student movement to happen in recent years.

We have started encouraging our members to become educated and committed to creating consent culture on campus in light of Okanagan College's new Sexual Violence Policy, and our endorsement of the Let's Get Consensual Campaign—details on both of these provided further ahead in this report.

This document contains an overview of the work we accomplished as an organization in our 2016-17 year. It was our pleasure to serve you, our members, and we look forward to serving you in this upcoming year as well.




Salmon Arm Candlelight Vigil

Every year our Salmon Arm campus council hosts a Vigil on or around December 6th to acknowledge the National Day of Remembrance and Action against Violence Against Women. This event is held with many other groups across Canada and was established in 1991 by the Parliament of Canada. This day marks the anniversary of the murders in 1989 of 14 young women at L’Ecole Polytechnique de Montreal. They were targeted because they were women. This event is an important reminder that violence against women still exists. We presented screenings of documentaries about the Highway of Tears in Northern BC and on the 1989 mass shooting. The event included a serving of hot chili on buns, plus coffee and hot chocolate. The vigil hosted speakers ranging from community members to Government officials. This event attracts a large number of people every year and OCSU will continue to honor and stand in solidarity on women’s rights and issues.

Salmon Arm continued to empower our members with a Sexual Health Awareness Day event complete with two extremely popular genital-themed mascots, penis shaped cookies, and tons of information about sexual health and local resources for sexual health.

The year was wrapped up much as it was ramped up—with a celebratory BBQ! Members were treated to a well-earned free bbq lunch, drinks, and prizes.

The 2016-17 year was a big year for our campaigns. Thanks to the voices of thousands of students across BC, the new British Columbia Government lowered student loan interest rates to just prime. Both Adult Basic Education and English as a Second Language were, once again, made free for students, additionally, tuition is going to be free for former youth in care—these changes will be helping some of our most vulnerable students, or soon to be students, in BC.

With these victories fresh in our minds, we continue to rally for these great campaigns:

## Tuition Campaign

Each year, OCSU lobbies the Okanagan College Board of Governors on how to best spend and allocate student fees paid to Okanagan College for the following academic year. This campaign consists of research and the preparation of a speech that a student representative will present to the Board of Governors. In 2017, we lobbied the Board of Governors to look into bringing back a

## Students are Voting

Every year OCSU puts on Bottled Water Free events where students could participate in a taste test between bottled water and tap water, learn more about the effects of bottled water on our environment, sign the petition to help make OC bottled water free and receive a free water bottle.

## Let's Get Consensual



Let's Get Consensual is a new campaign that OCSU, along with the British Columbia Federation of Students (BCFS), adopted last year. The aim of this campaign is to tear down rape culture and build up consent culture on campuses and surrounding communities. This is done through pledges, workshops and survivor supported attitudes and dialogue.

For the 2016-17 academic year, Okanagan College received a one time grant for support and outreach efforts for promotion of the newly established sexual violence and misconduct policies. OCSU partnered up with college administration for implementing the Let's Get Consensual

campaign, a previously endorsed campaign run by the University of Victoria Student Society and the Anti-Violence Project. OCSU hired coordinators on each campus, and additional coordinators were hired by the Vernon Student Association on the Vernon campus. These coordinators were tasked with creating a campaign strategy and rolling the campaign out on their respective campuses.

Throughout the year, each campus held Be More Than a Bystander training sessions where students were shown how to safely intervene when witnessing sexual harassment and assault. OCSU also hosted Let's Get Consensual events throughout the year, where students signed pledges and received various materials such as buttons, keychains, stickers, and coasters.

In July 2017, OCSU staff members attended a three day training session hosted by the Anti-Violence Project. This training allows the staff members to facilitate Consent Workshops. Each campus will be deciding how to proceed with workshops in the 2017-18 term.

## International Women's Day

Every March, OCSU holds International Women's Day events on each campus. This event features trivia, free cupcakes and t-shirts, a photobooth, and various other activities depending on the campus. This past year Kelowna added an evening event that featured a screening of the documentary *The Hunting Ground*. Penticton featured live performances of *The Vagina Monologues*. There continues to be media coverage for the events, this year with two television interviews featuring representatives of OCSU as well as OC students and faculty members. International Women's Day remains one of our most popular events.

## Sexual Health Awareness Day

Sexual Health Awareness Days are long-standing events for OCSU. These events are designed to remove the stigma surrounding sexual health conversations and provide students with access to information they may not normally seek out.

We hold events highlighting sexual health on all campuses. At the events two student representatives dressed up as genitalia mascots and took pictures with students to help lighten the mood. Students also received free cookies and were given access to tons of information as well as sexual health supplies. Nurses attended the event in Kelowna to help answer questions concerning

## Mental Health on Campus

Encouraging safe and inclusive spaces on campus remains a focus for OCSU. This year as part of the tuition campaign, we lobbied the administration to reintroduce the campus health nurse. The college used to receive a grant to have a nurse available for students on campus. We encouraged the college to allocate an appropriate amount from the budget to this valuable service as they no longer receive this funding. In addition to lobbying for a nurse, we encouraged the college administration to improve counselling services on campuses, particularly

in Kelowna where the service level is lower than other campuses.

In other efforts, OCSU participated in Stress Busting events on every campus in both the Fall and Winter semesters. There was free food, resources, colouring, and the ever popular Therapy dogs ready for pets and stress busting. OCSU also held Beyond the Blues events on the Kelowna and Penticton campuses in conjunction from the Canadian Mental Health Association. We gave out free bagged lunches, pamphlets, and colouring pages. These events are aimed at reducing the stigma of mental illness and ensuring students have access to resources for mental health.

## Student Movement Victories

In 2016-17, OCSU, along with our partners of the BCFS lobbied hard to make both Adult Basic Education (ABE) and English as a Second Language (ESL) free for members. On August 9, 2017, the Provincial Government announced that ABE would be free once again. Our campaign was called Don't Close the Doors and we gathered over 10,000 signatures for the campaign with our peers across the province. The campaign was presented to, and endorsed by over 20 municipal governments across BC. We also lobbied hard with Okanagan College to ensure that students had access to funding while attending ABE courses. We helped established additional financial aid resources for students and helped with promoting for the OC Upgrading Bursary (OCUB) and the Adult Upgrading Grant (AUG).

## Interest rates on Student Loans

In conjunction with our efforts to Make ABE Free, we also lobbied the government on reducing interest on BC student loans. BC Students paid the highest rate of interest on Student Loans with a range of 2.5% to 5% above prime. After months of lobbying at the provincial level of government through meetings with MLA's with the BCFS and submitting our presentation to the Select Standing Committee on Government Finance and Services in September 2016, we collectively argued that a reduction of interest would be in the best interest for the citizens of BC. The BC government announced that effective August 1, 2017, interest on student loans would be lowered to just prime. The government's documents suggest that this change would collectively save students \$17 million a year.

The OCSU offers a number of services to meet your needs as a student. Our services come in a variety of forms. Some are campus based and locally developed, such as free lockers in Penticton, Lunch Once a Month in Salmon Arm, and print services in Kelowna. Some services are organized for all members across our three campuses. These free services include our water bottles, pens, lanyards, and highlighters. Other services are organized through our partnership with the British Columbia Federation of Students (BCFS). Our partnership services include the free members handbook, the OCSU website, the OCSU App, and our extended Health and Dental plan.

## Handbook


Every year, OCSU hands out over 4,000 handbooks to students absolutely free. This is achieved by partnering with the British Columbia Federation of Students (BCFS). This project allows the OCSU to deliver a well-made members handbook dayplanner with full color, high quality paper with unique cover art, and local flavour.

The handbooks are also a commitment to sustainability; consumer recycled material. Even the binding is recyclable! The External Committee works on the design as well as the cover. In 2016-17 the External Committee took the inspiration from the previous years handbook and created a cover that was of all three campuses, with art inspired by Okanagan orchards.

## Frosh Supplies

At the beginning of each year, the OCSU provides of free frosh supplies. In 2016-17, we gave out water bottles, handbooks, hand sanitizers and lanyards designed to get members

while also providing our students with a few items that will come in handy throughout the busy semester. We also gave away additional swag such as usb's, phone wallets, S'well style water bottles and portable phone chargers to help students in need!

## Health and Dental

OCSU continues to provide students with access to extended health and dental coverage. This program is easily our biggest and most sought after service. Each year OCSU provides extended coverage to thousands of students and families through GreenShield.

In 2016-17, there were just under 2400 students and multiple families enrolled in the health and dental program across the three campuses. Students who have coverage through other means are able to opt-out of the program by the 3rd Friday after their program begins.

We launched an online opt out system for the health and dental plan. Over 500 students opted out of the plan using this method. This has led to more efficient tracking for opt outs and has

reduced our carbon footprint.

## Student Initiatives

Students who wish to start a movement to improve life on their campus are able to fill out a form online where they can request support from OCSU through funding or other means. This program was designed to provide monetary aid and support to students who wish to do everything from creating a new service on campus, to attending a conference, to projects that will benefit the campus community. The Board of Directors reviews and decides whether to approve the initiative or not, and how much in resources will be allocated towards them. This was our first year trying out Student Initiatives at OCSU and it was extremely successful with 12 applications submitted across our campuses including a Vegan and Vegetarian Initiative, a Pride group and a Toastmasters Club. Students are able to apply online through [ocsu.ca](http://ocsu.ca) as an individual or as a group. The OCSU will grant funds or provide in kind services for successful applications. We hope to continue to grow this successful program in the coming years.



## Sexual Health Supplies

We offer students free safer sex supplies and feminine hygiene products inside each office. This popular service has been around for years and continues to be one of our most utilized services by members.

Each year we add on to this service by providing pamphlets, resources and, when possible, a nurse on campus to answer students questions and provide no-cost STI testing on site.

## International Student Identity Card

We are proud to offer another one of our extremely popular services available free to all of our members: the International Student Identity Card, a.k.a. ISIC.

Every year we continue to grow this service and last year we managed to expand to over 150 local businesses throughout the Okanagan.

Colleges and Universities all over the world offer this card to students, giving access to discounts in over 60 countries worldwide including all discounts through the Student Saver Program. Last year the OCSU was able to provide over 1350 cards to OC students, our biggest production yet.

Some local discounts included 2 for 1 appetizers at the Barking Parrot in Penticton, 15% off Boston Pizza in Kelowna and up to 30% off the Print Centre at Staples in Salmon Arm. A premium provincial discount of 25% off BC Greyhound and Pacific Coastal Airlines is accessible online through the ISIC card as well. Students can sign up for free in any of our offices, or by attending an ISIC event, where we promote the discount card and hand out free cupcakes.

# Ongoing Projects

Outside of the events, services and campaigns we provide, we have been working on a few other projects in order to make life the best it can be on campuses for our members.

## Meeting With MLA's.

In August 2017, OCSU met with Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Training, Melanie Mark. The OCSU was able to discuss the importance of funding for post-secondary institutions in order to keep costs low, discussed the need for a grants program in BC, and discussed affordable housing options. OCSU also prepared a written submission to the Select Standing Committee of Finance and Government Services.

## Bursaries Established

The Board of Directors was approached by the Bright from the Start Campaign to consider donating to the Penticton Daycare Centre. After careful consideration, the OCSU Board Members determined to donate a total of \$3000 towards the new daycare centre. Of the \$3000, \$1500 would be for the general construction of the new building and \$1500 would be for the implementation of two \$750 bursaries for student in the daycare.

## OCSU Space on Kelowna Campus

The Kelowna OCSU office serves the majority of our members but we do so out of the smallest space of all three of our offices. Our presence on campus needs to grow and this past year the provincial government announced that funding will be provided to reconstruct the Health Building. Given that the OCSU leases space in the Health building, we will need to relocate. This past year we worked with the architectural firm, Faction Inc on a Space Needs Assessment to determine the realities of what OCSU needs at the bare minimum to function as a service that supports students

based on current government building codes. The Board began a conversation about the future needs of OCSU and our members in Kelowna.

## CFS Petition Process

During the Winter 2017 semester, each campus worked on acquiring signatures for a coordinated effort across British Columbia towards a petition to question our continued membership with the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS) and Canadian Federation of Students- Services (CFSS) due to a decline in services provided by CFS/CFSS. There is a threshold of 15% required by the CFS/CFSS, which OCSU reached in April 2017. The petition was sent via registered mail in the spring. OCSU received confirmation from CFS/CFSS in late August that the 15% threshold was met. Work is ongoing regarding the referendum scheduling.

## Right to Life Society Campus Visit

In April, during one of the final weeks of classes, the Right to Life Society came to the Kelowna campus under the protection of the Charter of Rights and Freedom to sound their pro-life, anti-abortion, message through pamphlets and large scale signs and visuals. These images were violent in nature and many of the students who were forced to walk by them felt threatened and unsafe as a result of the Right to Life Society's message. To counter the group, OCSU was on hand with signs informing members that the OCSU office was a safe space for students who needed a reprieve from the hostile environment. OCSU engaged in positive conversation with members off-side of the group and passed out OCSU staff members' emails for students who wanted to send in complaints. Emails from members voicing their concerns about the group were compiled and sent to Okanagan College administration. OCSU held several conversations with College administration to discuss better ways of informing members for the next time the Right to Life Society demonstrates on campus.

## Smart Start

As an addition to fall Orientation events, Okanagan College held Smart Start sessions for first year students in Fall 2017. OCSU held a session as an introduction to the Students' Union. The session was 45 long minutes and covered various services and campaigns that OCSU offers. Continuing to partner with this event is recommended going forward.
